CHAIRMAN and CEO'S Report 2020-2021

The COVID pandemic was in full flight during 2020 impacting on all aspects of our lives. Looking forward, it was difficult to foretell what the immediate and longer-term future might be.

Notwithstanding, the trials and tribulations that confronted us, SwimmingSA has managed to conduct a successful year both administratively and competitively. It is true that all our swimming meets were conducted within the confines of a COVID management plan, formulated with relevant authorities and venue management. I am pleased to report that with the ongoing assistance, cooperation and understanding of all we achieved what many may have thought not possible.

Our success was very much due to our hard-working CEO and her team for meeting the challenges head-on with courage, commitment, foresight, and tenacity. On behalf of the Board and the SwimmingSA community I thank them for their efforts in the face of adversity. I have no doubt that SwimmingSA and our affiliated clubs are seen as genuine leaders in striving to create a pathway back to some semblance of normality. Having said that, I believe there is still a way to go, and compliance and vigilance will see us through.

Following a historic one-year postponement, the Tokyo 2020 Games successfully went ahead despite the challenges the pandemic presented. Australia's results were outstanding with Madison Wilson bring home a gold and a bronze and Kyle Chalmers a silver and two bronze. To top off his Olympic success, Kyle broke the 100m SC Freestyle World Record at the FINA World Cup in Kazan topping the list of fastest men ever in the event. The Games were followed by a successful Paralympics with our own Michelle Doyle as Swim Team Manager. We congratulate our Para representatives on their individual performances Jesse Aungles and Isabella Vincent winning a silver and bronze at her first Games.

With the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games and the Paris Olympics in 2024 now on the horizon along with the excitement around the announcement of the Brisbane 2032 Games, one wonders how many young athletes commencing their journey in the sport will represent us at those Games.

I take this opportunity to congratulate the annual perpetual trophy winners and 'Club of the Year', Barossa Swimming Club. Barossa were formed just four years ago, have grown to an athlete membership of over 100 and have re-established the sport in the Barossa Valley.

On the National front, Swimming Australia has appointed experienced sports administrator Eugenie Buckley as Chief Executive Officer (CEO), following the resignation of Alex Baumann for health related reasons. We would also like to acknowledge and congratulate our own Board Member Neil Martin, who was successfully elected to the Swimming Australia Board. Neil, an Olympian and former Swimming Australia President, has served on our Board for eight years. His counsel and experience have been invaluable to SwimmingSA and on behalf of all I thank him for his contribution and wish them well in his endeavors in the national arena.

I have previously said that it is my belief that participation is our primary goal. Champions will emerge as athletes commit and dedicate themselves to the aspirations and goals, they set themselves in conjunction with their coaches. In this respect, our numbers have remained strong despite the challenges presented by COVID.

As always, our thanks go to our sponsors, partners, athletes, coaches, technical officials, volunteers and sub-committee representatives for their ongoing support and commitment. You are all and important and integral part of the swimming community as are the parents and carers of our athletes.

The Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing continue to provide guidance and support and we appreciate their ongoing interest in our sport. The management and staff at the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre have confronted the challenges presented during the need to establish compliance with COVID guidelines and restrictions and the ongoing support is important to our goals.

In addition, Sport SA (of which we are a member) continues to advocate on behalf of all sporting organizations in this State and we appreciate their efforts.

In closing, I am hopeful that we are coming out of the challenges and restrictions imposed on us to stay on top of the COVID virus. I am sure that we will still have levels of compliance as the restrictions are eased and we need to ensure compliance so that we might (in time) see a return to normality.

To my fellow Directors, thank you for your commitment and the collegiate approach we have taken over these difficult times. Together we continue to review our strategy and I look forward to resuming this over the coming year and invite members of our community to join our board and provide their expertise as we strive for strategic success.

We also say goodbye to our friend, mentor, life member and hero Phil Bowen after his passing. We are forever thankful for Phil's many contributions to the sport.

Finally, I again encourage all athletes to commit to your goals and give of your best. We have been privileged to see some great personal achievements over the year despite the challenges faced by all. Keep up the good work and we wish you every success for this season and beyond.





DR PHIL BOWEN


The SA Swimming Community mourns the loss of one of our long-serving volunteers, Phil Bowen.

Objectives

The Vision of SwimmingSA Incorporated is to be recognised as one of the Top 5 Sports in SA. The Mission is to provide a structure, which creates, and supports increased participation, enjoyment and athletic achievement for South Australians within the sport of swimming.

Strategy for achieving the objectives

During the year through our three Strategic Pillars of Partnerships, Participation and Performance, SwimmingSA Incorporated has implemented key strategies such as those noted below to achieve our objectives:

- Increased the number of people involved in coaching and officiating through a range of inclusive opportunities and programs that promote, encourage and up skill these stakeholders;
- Encouraged best practice and innovative club management by providing leadership, support, resources, education & training and business tools that promote improved efficiencies, effectiveness and outcomes;
- Developed an integrated competition pathway and enhanced national and international profile through securing major swimming competitions to South Australia;
- Optimised funding opportunities through government, Swimming Australia and sporting programs and grants; and
- Enhanced relationships with State & local Government, State political bodies, Events SA, SASI, ASCTA, SAL other aquatic sports and delivery agents to increase the profile of swimming.

SwimmingSA Incorporated Officers' Report 30 June 2021

Principal activities

During the financial year the principal continuing activities of the incorporated association were to:

- Promote and encourage participation in swimming activities;
- Conduct sustainability activities with regions and clubs;
- Provide high performance development and competition for athletes:
- Foster partnerships with other SA Aquatic Sports:
- Administer the sport for the benefit of all participants; and
- Implementation of a best practice Safe Sport Framework.

There was no significant change in the nature of the activity of the incorporated association during the year.

Performance measures

The incorporated association measures its performance in the amount of funds put back into activities of the sport. Such activities are measured on participation numbers, athletic performance and governance sustainability. The key performance measures are funds raised compared to developmental expenses, total cost per activity delivered to the community and the total number of activities conducted.

Review of operations

The incorporated association for 2021 financial year recorded a surplus of \$25,483 (2020: surplus \$166,336).

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

No matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2021, other than those disclosed in the financial statements, that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect:

- the incorporated association's operations in future financial years, or
- the results of those operations in future financial years, or
- the incorporated association's state of affairs in future financial years.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

The incorporated association expects to maintain the present status and level of operations and hence there are no likely developments in the association's operations.

Environmental regulation

The incorporated association is not affected by any significant environmental regulation in respect of its operations.

The incorporated association's Public Officer is Michelle Doyle.

Subsequent Events

As a result of the evolving nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, its economic impact and the rapidly evolving government restrictions to contain it, the incorporated association is not in a position to reasonably estimate any impact to the future financial performance and the financial position of the incorporated association in any changed circumstances that may arise.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), and the South Australian legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Going concern basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the incorporated association is exempt from income tax under Div 56 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Plant and equipment

3-7 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the incorporated association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The incorporated association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Inventories

Stock on hand is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises of purchase and delivery costs, net of rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

COMPETITIONS COMMITTEE REPORT 2020 – 2021

COVID-19 has continued to affect peoples lives, and swimming has not been immune to the restrictions to which we have been subjected. Lockdowns, border closures, density limits, mask wearing, and check-ins are but a few of the things that have become parts of our lives.

Our Long Course Championships were again very successful, however COVID restrictions necessitated splitting our Championships into two meets – Open and Multi-class, and Age Championships. The open meet was again reported on by the international swimming media due to the presence of potential Olympians including Matt Temple and Kaylee McKeown competing at our meet in preparation for the delayed Tokyo Olympics. Our Age Championships were held in early March and proved to be an excellent meet with many of our swimmers qualifying for the Australian Age Championships that were held in Queensland in April.

Out of necessity, this year's Country Championships were held at the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre in Adelaide. The Competitions Committee acknowledges that moving the location to the metropolitan area from a country pool changed the overall atmosphere and feeling of the Championships and may not have pleased all the stakeholders, the alternative of cancelling the Country Championships was worse. We look forward to returning to country location for the next Country Championships.

Our Open Water State Championships was held in March. Unfortunately, due to COVID in New South Wales, the date and location of the Australian Open Water Championships was changed resulting in a clash with our date for our OWS Championships. Despite that, the meet was still a success, albeit with smaller numbers than previous years.

A change to our competition structure was implemented this year. The previous Division 1 and Development meets were felt to be waning, with more interest in All-in meets. The decision was made to change the Swimming SA competitions to a totally "All-in" competition structure, separating swimmers into "Junior" and "Senior" cohorts based on age. It was also decided to alternate the timing of the Junior and Senior sessions to maximise participation. This has led to some imbalance in the numbers of participants, especially in the Senior cohort which has resulted in sessions of more than 6 hours. Further work will need to be undertaken to improve these meets in the future.

COVID-19 has also influenced out grass-roots clubs, resulting in several clubs having to reschedule or even cancel their open carnivals over the course of the year. We hope that the forthcoming year will allow our clubs to return to a more 'normal' model of how they run their meets albeit still with some restrictions with entry numbers. Hopefully the restrictions introduced to respond to the outbreak of COVID-19 will be reduced moving forward. On a positive note, I would like to commend the Barossa Swimming Club for running a successful carnival for the first time, and encourage all clubs to explore running a carnival, either by themselves or as a combined event. At the risk of singling out one meet, the combined meet run by Tea Tree Gully and STARplex is an example of inter-club cooperation.

Thanks

I would again like to commend our CEO Michelle Doyle and her team for the excellent work that they do in the background. They have had to be agile to make changes at relatively short notice. Michelle Doyle in particular has done all the negotiating with SA Health and SAPOL in order to make our meets COVID compliant.

I would like to thank the members of our committee, Donna Sampson, Michelle Whitaker and coaches Shaun Curtis and Anthony Davies for their work. I would especially like to thank Ynez Grimes for the outstanding contributions in taking the minutes of our meetings. Thanks also to our staff liaison Cory Bampton for his work in compiling results, modelling of qualifying times, and liaising with the coaches for feedback to present to the committee. This makes our committee work so much easier. Cory, it is greatly appreciated.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the passing of Phil Bowen in March. Phil was an integral part of the Competitions Committee for many years, and I counted him as a mentor and friend. Vale Phil.

SwimmingSA DEVELOPMENT REPORT 2020-2021

While the 2020-2021 season was still held under the ongoing COVID restrictions that were in place around the country, some easing of these throughout the last 12 months meant we were able to get back to running several activities for our performance squads, coaches, and clubs throughout the year. We also saw Swimming Australia return to hold the National Championship meets once again with the National Open Water, National Age, National Open and the Olympic Trials all being successfully conducted during the season. SwimmingSA had representatives at all of these meets with some fantastic performances being achieved.

The highlight of the domestic racing calendar was the Australian Olympic Team Trials that were held in Adelaide in June. SwimmingSA had a total 28 athletes representing SA and their clubs at this meet. After a week of tough and fast racing, athletes Kyle Chalmers, Madison Wilson and coach Peter Bishop were selected to the Australian Olympic Team and athletes Jessie Aungles and Isabella Vincent were selected to represent Australia at the Paralympic Games in Tokyo. This was a fantastic result for these swimmers and their coaches, clubs, and families.

At the games, all team members did an amazing job representing their country proudly with Kyle returning with a silver and 2 bronze medals, Madison with a gold and a bronze medal and Isabella with a Silver and Bronze medal.

On the domestic front, SwimmingSA had a total of 74 swimmers representing 12 separate SA clubs at the National Age Championships on the Gold Coast in April. Theses swimmers made a total of 109 finals appearances and won 34 medals over the course of the meet. This was a fantastic result and shows the growth in the performance of our age group swimmers. This meet was followed by the Australian Championships which saw 21 swimmers representing 6 SA clubs. This small contingent achieved 36 finals placings and brought home 15 medals in a fantastic performance.

It is important to note that these meets were held under very heavy restrictions and only a few days out were in danger of being cancelled due to a COVID outbreak close by. All swimmers, coaches and support staff that attended these meets showed great resilience in not only participating in this event but swimming to such a high standard.

When discussing our performance programs, it is important to acknowledge the ongoing and significant support that the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing provide to Swimming SA and its members both through the South Australian Sports institute and the office itself. This strong support underpins many of the aspects of the performance program in South Australia. Without their ongoing support, the programs and support we provide annually would not be possible.

Lastly, I would like to thank all the coaches within SA for their continued commitment and support of the performance programs and of our sport in general. The time and effort you all apply to your positions is the reason our swimmers keep engaging in our sport and posting great results.
