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CHAIR REPORT 2021-2022

In closing our report at the end of last year we were hopeful that we were leaving behind the challenges and restrictions imposed upon us to stay on top of the COVID pandemic. The pleasing news is that we have slowly emerged from that situation and whilst vigilance is still required there is a feeling of a return to some normality in terms of the conduct of our sport and the administration and operation of the SwimmingSA entity.

Despite the issues that faced the swimming community, Swimming SA has managed to conduct a successful year both in terms of administration and competitive program. The success can be attributed to the ongoing assistance, cooperation, understanding and support of all affiliated clubs and members. I am convinced that as a sport, we have demonstrated leadership and tenacity in the face of adversity.

In addition to athletic excellence, they serve as role models for future generations of our athletes. Congratulations all – we salute you. We now look forward to the 2024 Paris Olympics and the 2032 Brisbane games.

I take this opportunity to congratulate the 'Club of the Year' Immanuel Piranhas whose growth and results have been exemplary. Several other clubs, including Barossa, Broken Hill Aquatic and Silver City also accomplished many of their clubs' strategic and operational goals throughout the year.

There is little doubt that the relationship between Swimming Australia and the member organisations (including SwimmingSA) is not what it was previously, and a review is to be conducted to ensure that all involved in the sport are as one. I am confident that all stakeholders will pull together to ensure Australia retains its mantle as one of the prolific swimming nations.

Champions will emerge as athletes commit and dedicate themselves to their aspirations and goals established in conjunction with their coach and club. I am pleased to report that one of our long-serving and valued Technical Officials, Darren McLachlan was awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) in recognition of services to the sport of swimming and behalf of all I congratulate and thank him for his contribution.

The Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing continue to provide guidance and support and we are indebted and appreciate their ongoing interest in our sport. The management and staff at the SA Aquatic and Leisure Centre have continued to provide valued support which is essential to our goals.

In addition, Sport SA (of which we are a prominent member) continues to advocate on behalf of all sporting organisations in the State and we endorse and commend their ongoing support.

Your Board has a strong collegiate approach to the challenges and obligations we face in the administration of the sport, and I acknowledge and thank them for their commitment as we continue to review our strategy in alignment with National arrangements and the relevant corporate obligations.

From a personal perspective I have enjoyed my 40 plus year journey within our sport and in the best interests of the sport, believe it is time that I look to reducing my day-to-day involvement and supporting new and fresh leadership. My interest in the sport will not wane and will continue my support.

I close by encouraging all athletes to commit to their goals and give of their best. We have been privileged to witness some outstanding performances from 'home grown' Champions over many years and those who have forged a path to success have set the example. To those who are our future and invite you to keep up the good work and wish you every success for the coming season and beyond.

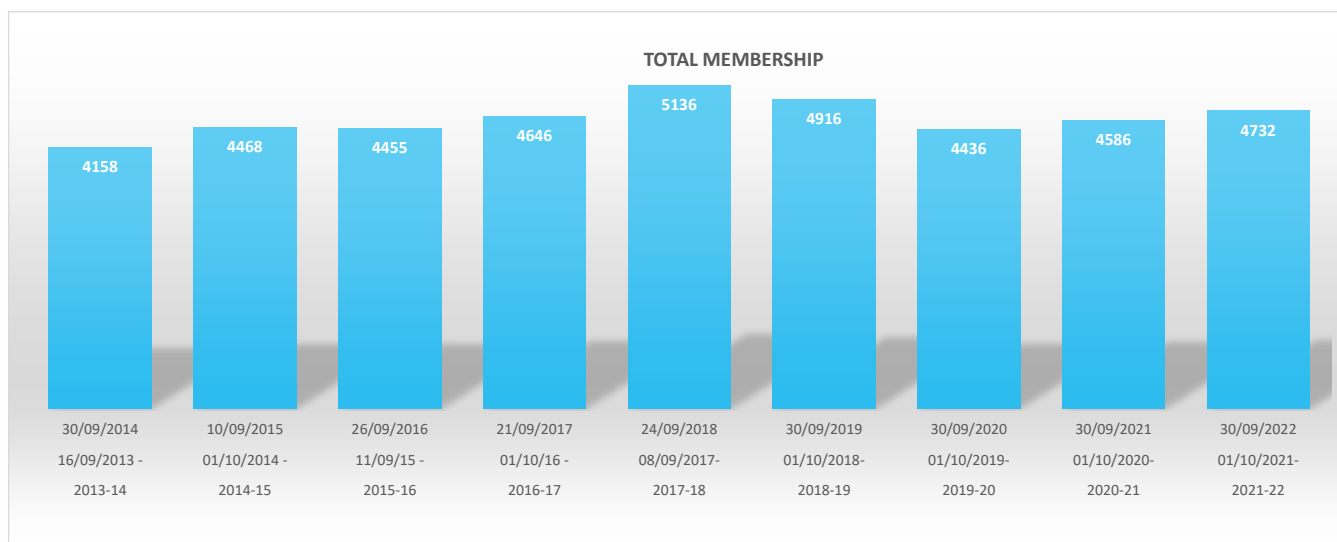

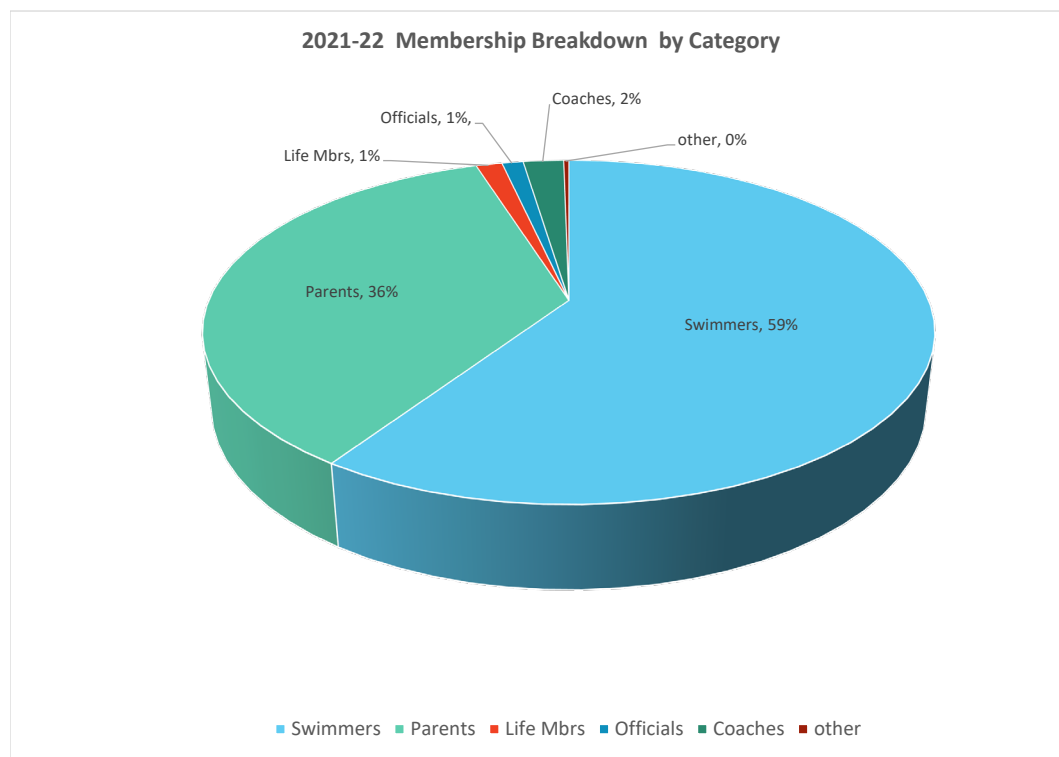

Principal activities

During the financial year the principal continuing activities of the incorporated association were to:

- Promote and encourage participation in swimming activities;
- Conduct sustainability activities with regions and clubs;
- Provide high performance development and competition for athletes;
- Foster partnerships with other SA Aquatic Sports;
- Administer the sport for the benefit of all participants; and
- Implementation of a best practice Safe Sport Framework.

There was no significant change in the nature of the activity of the incorporated association during the year.

Performance measures

The incorporated association measures its performance in the amount of funds put back into activities of the sport. Such activities are measured on participation numbers, athletic performance and governance sustainability. The key performance measures are funds raised compared to developmental expenses, total cost per activity delivered to the community and the total number of activities conducted.

Review of operations

The incorporated association for 2022 financial year recorded a surplus of \$16,683 (2021: surplus \$25,483).

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

No matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2022, other than those disclosed in the financial statements, that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect:

- the incorporated association's operations in future financial years, or
- the results of those operations in future financial years, or

The incorporated association expects to maintain the present status and level of operations and hence there are no likely developments in the association's operations.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the incorporated association:

Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting (Conceptual Framework)

The incorporated association has adopted the revised Conceptual Framework from 1 July 2021. The Conceptual Framework contains new definition and recognition criteria as well as new guidance on measurement that affects several Accounting Standards, but it has not had a material impact on the incorporated association's financial statements.

AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities

The incorporated association has adopted AASB 1060 from 1 July 2021. The standard provides a new Tier 2 reporting framework with simplified disclosures that are based on the requirements of IFRS for SMEs. The prior year financial report was prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The transition from the previous financial reporting framework to Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures has not affected the incorporated association's reported financial position, financial performance and cash flows

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), and the South Australian legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Going concern basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and all attached conditions will be complied with.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the incorporated association is exempt from income tax under Div 56 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Contract assets

Contract assets are recognised when the incorporated association has transferred goods or services to the customer but where the incorporated association is yet to establish an unconditional right to consideration. Contract assets are treated as financial assets for impairment purposes.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Plant and equipment	3-7 years
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The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the incorporated association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The incorporated association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Inventories

Stock on hand is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises of purchase and delivery costs, net of rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Contract liabilities

Contract liabilities represent the incorporated association's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer and are recognised when a customer pays consideration, or when the incorporated association recognises a receivable to reflect its unconditional right to consideration (whichever is earlier) before the incorporated association has transferred the goods or services to the customer.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

COMPETITIONS COMMITTEE REPORT 2021 – 2022

COVID-19 continued to provide challenges for swimming as we moved out of 2021 and into 2022. However, restrictions were gradually lifted in the middle of the year allowing the sport to return to previous ways of running meets.

Our Long Course Championships were again very successful. As the COVID-19 restrictions were still in place, we continued with the previous format of Open and Multi-class, and Age Championships. Due to the possibility of COVID-19 disrupting future selection meets, the Championships doubled as a “reserve” selection meet. The Country Championships returned to the country, being held in Renmark. Although there were some restrictions. Our Age State Championships were also very successful, despite being held under COVID-19 management plans.

Due to the changes to the Swimming Australia calendar implemented in 2022, our Short Course Championships were combined into a single meet in July. Whilst not ideal, it was none the less a successful meet. This meet has been scheduled as two separate meets – Age and Open/MC – in 2023, and I am hopeful that this format will be able to run as published.

Our Open Water State Championship returned to the more usual date in early December. Although there were fewer entrants from interstate, there meet had almost 200 entries. On the downside, South Australian swimmers are increasingly restricted in qualifying for our State Open Water Championships, and ultimately, Australian Open Water Championships due to the limited number of meets conducted in this state. Open water meets are resource intensive – both in people and equipment – and as a result are expensive and difficult to run. The Committee is acutely aware of this and is working on a plan to re-invigorate open water swimming in South Australia, but ultimately there will not be a short-term solution.

We continued with the “All-in” competition structure, separating swimmers into “Junior” and “Senior” cohorts based on age. It was also decided to alternate the timing of the Junior and Senior sessions to maximise participation. The imbalance in the numbers of participants, especially in the Senior cohort which has resulted in sessions of more than 6 hours has resulted in the decision to move the 12-year-old swimmers into the Junior cohort, and hopefully this will assist in evening out the session times in the future.

COVID-19 continued to affect our grass-roots clubs, resulting in several clubs having to re-schedule or even cancel their open carnivals over again, but we are now seeing a return to a more normal situation. However, many clubs are still struggling to run meets due to either lack of human resources to run a meet, or due to some of our regional pools being unavailable due to the pools being closed for major repairs or extensive refurbishments. The Committee thanks all the clubs that have been able to continue to provide a carnival program to our members. However, for clubs finding it difficult to run a meet as a single entity we encourage them to seek partner clubs to share the organisation and resourcing. We would also like clubs to work with us to investigate alternative meet structures rather than the long-standing ways that carnivals are run. To this end, I envisage running a forum in the future with interested parties on what types of meets could be run in the future.

Thanks

Again, I would again like to commend our CEO Michelle Doyle and her team for the excellent work that they do in the background. They have had to be agile to make changes at relatively short notice.

I would like to thank the members of our committee, Ynez Grimes, Donna Sampson, Michelle Whitaker and coaches Shaun Curtis and Anthony Davies for their work. I would especially like to thank Ynez Grimes for the outstanding contributions in taking the minutes of our meetings. Thanks also to our staff liaison Cory Bampton and Leanne Beames for their work and assistance. Cory's work in compiling results, modelling of qualifying times, and liaising with the coaches for feedback to present to the committee has been invaluable, and I would like to thank him especially and wish him well in the future. His contributions will be greatly missed.
